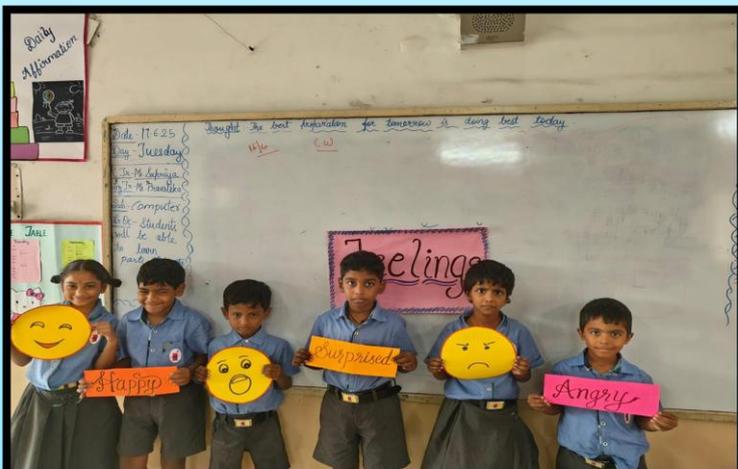


Expressing Emotions with Emojis!

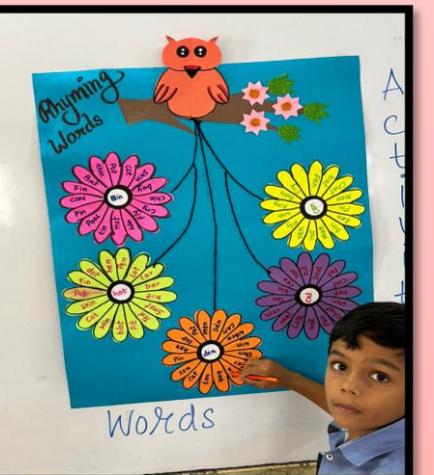
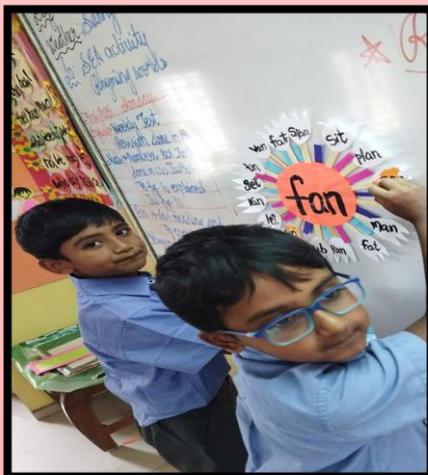
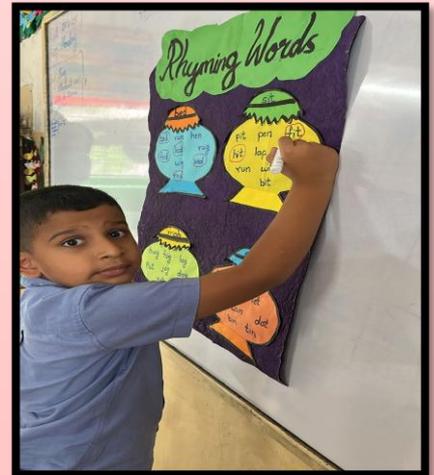
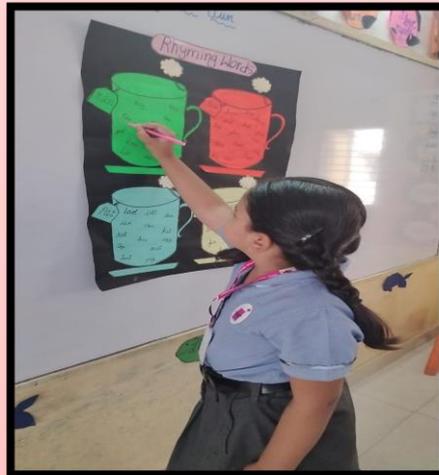
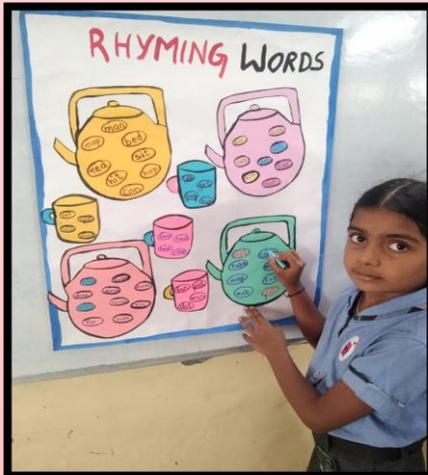
Learning with colours and creating the wonder words.
